beautiful elephant sculpture.**




Year One also studied Jackson Pollock and made their own paint splatter artworks!

Year Three also visited Tate Britain and took a walk through British art history.



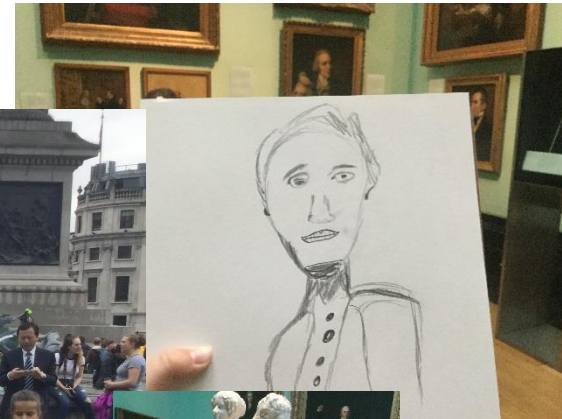
Charlotte Klein taught Year 3 how to make ink prints based on Frida Kahlo's fruit artwork.
